Purpose of the consultation

The future of the Saint-Ferdinand sector

The sector that is the subject of the consultation is located in the Saint-Henri neighbourhood. It sits between Notre-Dame Street West, Saint-Ferdinand and Saint-Ambroise Streets, and the CN railway tracks. The sector comprises two large sites to be developed, 257 Saint-Ferdinand Street and 4035 Saint-Ambroise Street, as well as other properties to be consolidated. It is dealing with a number of major issues, such as the proximity of railway activities, the preservation of existing economic activities, and housing needs. The purpose of this consultation is to gather opinions from the population regarding their vision for the future of the site and the guiding principles for its development.

The OCPM sets out a few open questions on themes related to the eco-neighbourhood to stimulate your thought process and allow you to tell us what you think of it, notably on the following topics:

- 1. Purpose
- 2. Housing
- 3. Mobility
- 4. Sustainable development
- 5. Community facilities

You may also use the theme "other opinions" to express your thoughts on any topic that is of concern or interest to you.



Theme 1: Purpose

The Sud-Ouest borough is seeking to redevelop the Saint-Ferdinand sector while maintaining existing commercial, industrial and residential uses. The redevelopment aims to promote a mix of mutually compatible uses.

Maximum heights of two to four storeys are currently planned for the northern section of the area, while the section to the south of Louis-Cyr park allows two to six storeys.






Figure 2: View of downtown




- What would you like to see on the sector's land?

Theme 2: Housing

The Sud-Ouest borough would like to densify the Saint-Ferdinand sector for residential uses, among others. Given the proximity of the Place Saint-Henri station, the area could also be considered appropriate for an increase in the number of units and a revision of heights allowed.

Moreover, it is important to note that the properties are private and that residential developments will be subject to the By-law for a mixed metropolis.





- To what types of clienteles should the housing supply be geared primarily and in what proportions (for families, for seniors, for students, etc.)?
- What would be the ideal types of housing and in what proportions (condos, plexes, social housing, affordable housing, etc.)?




Theme 3: mobility

The Saint-Ferdinand sector is bounded by Saint-Ferdinand and Saint-Ambroise Streets and the Canadian National (CN) railway tracks. It is located near the Place Saint-Henri metro station and the neighbourhood's main commercial artery, Notre-Dame Street.

The Sud-Ouest borough would like to carry out an exemplary development geared to an ecological transition that is in keeping with Montréal's environmental goals (Sustainable Montréal, Climate Plan, Canopy Action Plan, etc.).






Figure 8: Soccer field near Louis-Cyr park
